Grants of up to €10,000 are available for projects that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Help displaced youth have a voice and engage in participatory dialogue with other youth, youth organisations and host communities; • Help displaced youth strengthen their capacity and skills development; • That better integrate displaced youth within their host communities. <p>To be eligible, projects must take place within one of the Council of Europe member states (this includes the UK) and must be submitted on behalf of a youth organisation legally registered in Europe.
